# **Course Description:**

This course examines Sinophone literature written by Chinese immigrant writers from different parts of the world, including North America, Europe, and Asia. The course explores diverse Chinese diasporic experiences spanning from the early twentieth century to the contemporary period. Students will read literary works in relation to the global history of Chinese immigration as well as intercultural and interracial experiences. The course is taught in English.

**Prerequisite(s):** 1.0 essay course from category A or B

# **Learning Objectives:**

By the end of this course, students will be able to

- Identify representative works of Sinophone literature and their artistic features;
- Understand diverse Chinese diasporic experiences around the world;
- Gain a critical understanding of the social and cultural issues concerning Chinese immigrants;
- Explore interactions between the Chinese and other ethnic communities;
- Develop analytical skills and critical thinking abilities in studying Sinophone literature.

# **Textbooks and Other Required Resources:**

Readings will be available through Course Readings on OWL unless otherwise indicated.

## **Class Methods:**

Classes are usually composed of a lecture as well as a film screening or a discussion session led by students. Discussion will be based on the assigned readings. Students are required to participate actively in the discussion.

# Attendance and Participation

Attendance and participation do not simply mean that you attend all classes, coming to class on time and staying until the end. It is most important that you read the texts and come to class prepared. You must actively participate in the discussion and interact with the instructor and your fellow students.

# <u>Assignments</u>

There are two assignments (5% for each) throughout the semester. The assignments are in various formats and are due on **Feb. 8 and March 22**. The instructions for each assignment will be provided in class.

# **Quizzes** and Test

The first quiz (5%) is scheduled on **Jan. 25** and covers the content in week 2. The second quiz (5%) is scheduled on **Feb. 1** and covers the content in week 3. The test will take place in class on **March 15**. It is two hours in length and covers lectures and readings from week 5 to week 8. No use of reference materials or electronic devices is permitted. The exam format will be given in class prior to the exams.

# Presentation and Term Paper

Students will sign up for the session that they plan to do their presentation. You should prepare a short oral presentation for 10 minutes and two questions for discussion. You are required to submit an outline of your presentation as well as discussion questions and your thoughts (including a hard copy and an electronic copy) on the day of your presentation.

Students will write a research paper of at least 2000 words based on the presentation (major changes to the topic must be consulted with and approved by the instructor by March 22). Please provide a word count at the end of your paper. You must consult scholarly books and articles and not limit your research to Internet sources. All the primary and secondary sources must be appropriately cited in the paper and listed in your bibliography in MLA format. No form of plagiarism or academic dishonesty will be tolerated. The hard copy and electronic copy of the essay must be submitted by **April 10**.

Specific instructions for the presentation and term paper will be provided in class.

# **Special Instructions:**

- 1. Once you sign up for your presentation, you cannot change your topic without the permission of the instructor. There will be no grade given in the case of no-show without prior notice.
- 2. There is a penalty for late submission of the hard copy and electronic copy of the presentation outline and term paper. The penalty is 10% for each calendar day to a total of three days. Assignments more than three days late will not be accepted except in the case of documented medical or compassionate circumstances. Late assignments should be submitted to the drop box located outside the Administrative Assistants' Office (A116).

## **Statement on Use of Electronic Devices**

It is not appropriate to use electronic devices (such as, but not limited to, laptops, tablets, cell phones) in the classroom for non-classroom activities. # Statement on Use of Personal Response Systems ("Clickers")

Personal Response Systems ("clickers") may be used in some classes. If clickers are to be used in a class, it is the responsibility of the student to ensure that the device is activated and functional. Students must see their instructor if they have any concerns about whether the clicker is malfunctioning. Students must use only their own clicker. If clicker records are used to compute a portion of the course grade:

- the use of somebody else's clicker in class constitutes a scholastic offence
- the possession of a clicker belonging to another student will be interpreted as an attempt to commit a scholastic offence.

# **Academic Consideration for Missed Work**

All students pursuing academic consideration, regardless of type, must contact their instructors no less than 24 hours following the end of the period of absence to clarify how they will be expected to fulfill the academic responsibilities missed during their absence. Students are reminded that they should consider carefully the implications of postponing tests or midterm exams or delaying submission of work, and are encouraged to make appropriate decisions based on their specific circumstances.

# Policy on Academic Consideration for a Medical/Non-Medical Absence

(a) Consideration on <u>Medical Grounds</u> for assignments worth *less than 10%* of final grade: Consult Instructor Directly and Contact Academic Advising

When seeking consideration on medical grounds for assignments worth less than 10% of the final

course grade, the student should contact the instructor directly. The student need only share broad outlines of the medical situation. The instructor **may** require the student to submit documentation to the academic advisors, in which case she or he will advise the student and inform the academic advisors to expect documentation. If documentation is requested, the student will need to complete and submit the <u>Student Medical Certificate</u>. The instructor may <u>not</u> collect medical documentation. The advisors will contact the instructor when the medical documentation is received, and will outline the severity and duration of the medical challenge as expressed on the Student Medical Certificate and in any other supporting documentation. The student will be informed that the instructor has been notified of the presence of medical documentation, and will be instructed to work as quickly as possible with the instructor on an agreement for accommodation.

# b) Medical Grounds for assignments worth 10% or more of final grade: Go Directly to Academic Advising

University Senate policy, which can be found at <u>Academic Calendar - Western University (uwo.ca)</u> requires that all student requests for accommodation on medical grounds for assignments worth 10% or more of the final grade be made directly to the academic advising office of the home faculty (for Huron students, the "home faculty" is Huron), with supporting documentation in the form (minimally) of the Senate-approved Student Medical Certificate found at: <a href="https://www.uwo.ca/univsec/pdf/academic\_policies/appeals/medicalform.pdf">https://www.uwo.ca/univsec/pdf/academic\_policies/appeals/medicalform.pdf</a>.

The documentation is submitted in confidence and will not be shown to instructors. The advisors will contact the instructor when the medical documentation is received, and will outline the severity and duration of the medical challenge as expressed on the Student Medical Certificate and in any other supporting documentation. The student will be informed that the instructor has been notified of the presence of medical documentation, and will be instructed to work as quickly as possible with the instructor on an agreement for accommodation. The instructor will not normally deny accommodation where appropriate medical documentation is in place and where the duration it describes aligns with the due date(s) of assignment(s). Before denying a request for accommodation on medical grounds, the instructor will consult with the Dean. The instructor's decision is appealable to the Dean.

# <u>c)</u> Consideration on <u>Non-Medical</u> Grounds: Consult Huron Support Services/Academic Advising, or email <u>huronsss@uwo.ca</u>.

Students seeking academic consideration for a **non-medical** absence (e.g. varsity sports, religious, compassionate, or bereavement) will be required to provide appropriate documentation. All consideration requests must include a completed <u>Consideration Request Form</u>. Late penalties may apply at the discretion of the instructor.
