2. Course Description

This course enables students to master literary reading, including the understanding of the major aspects of French and Francophone literatures and cultures, their particular histories as well as their relationship to the larger discipline of arts and humanities. The course provides tools for textual analysis, and improves written and oral communication in French.

The main goal of this class is to break the ice of time and distance. We will explore the past to better understand how it truly was, how it was transmitted to us, and how it still resonates.

Assignments will consist of two presentations (exposés), two tests, and a take-home exam where students will discuss a text of their choices that they enjoyed the most during the term.

3. Course Learning Outcomes

- 1. Les étudiants auront acquis une compréhension générale de l'histoire et de la culture française du moyen-âge à la fin du 19ème siècle en la reliant systématiquement aux phénomènes littéraires et artistiques.
- Les étudiants seront placés en position de témoins directs, comme lecteurs ou observateurs de certaines productions artistiques pour les amener à apprécier d'un œil nouveau les richesses d'une civilisation dont nous sommes encore très largement les héritiers.
- 3. Ils/elles seront aussi acteurs et actrices de la classe en produisant des exposés thématiques qui complèteront les savoirs.

4. Ils et elles amélioreront la maîtrise du français à l'oral et à l'écrit à travers la lecture d'articles, d'extraits d'œuvres littéraires et le commentaire de documents divers.

4. Textbooks and Course Materials

Texts and course materials will be provided by the instructor and available in OWL. A good French dictionary is always useful. Students are also encouraged to check https://www.wordreference.com/fr/.

Also, https://www.antidote.info/fr/ is a required app/software that you'll be able to use in this class as well as other French classes at Huron.

5. Methods of Evaluation

Evaluation

Présence et participation active en classe : 10%

Students will pick two « exposés » amongst three categories (see below).

<u>Attendance and Active Participation:</u> Active participation and attendance is required for this course. **10**%

<u>Tests:</u> There will be two 90 minutes in-class tests per term. Tests will cover material studied in class. A review session will also be scheduled prior to the tests. **2 tests = 30%**

Exposés en classe/Présentations: Students must select two exposés (in two different categories). Schedule will be determined in class, by September 14th. Exposés will take place on Thursdays (beginning September 28th, and excepting October 12th, November 16 & 30). Each "exposé" will run for 25 minutes (ish!). See appendix A: "Liste des exposés". **Two exposés = 2 x 15% (30%).**

<u>Travail final à la maison/Final take home exam</u>: Dans un essai de 2000 mots, chaque étudiant(e) traitera d'un sujet à choisir parmi deux options (un essai de synthèse ou une analyse de texte).

1) Il/elle présentera les enseignements les plus intéressants d'un thème vu en classe (évènement historique, mouvement littéraire ou artistique, etc), exposera les raisons de son choix.

2) Il/elle sélectionnera un texte littéraire, journalistique ou historique, une œuvre artistique (film, musique) de la période étudiée ou traitant de la période étudiée et en proposera une analyse. Le choix devra être discuté et validé par l'enseignant avant la fin de la classe.

Due date to take home exam to be determined according to the official exam schedule.

Students are responsible for ensuring that they have successfully completed all course prerequisites and that they have not completed any course antirequisites. All papers submitted for such checking will be included as source documents in the reference database for the purpose of detecting plagiarism of papers subsequently submitted to the system. Use of the service is subject to the licensing agreement, currently between The University of Western Ontario and Turnitin.com (http://www.turnitin.com).

Statement on Use of Electronic Devices

It is not appropriate to use electronic devices (such as, but not limited to, laptops, tablets, cell phones) in the classroom for non-classroom activities. Such activity is disruptive and distracting to other students and to the instructor, and can inhibit learning. Students are expected to respect the classroom environment and to refrain from inappropriate use of technology and other electronic devices in class.

Statement on Use of Personal Response Systems ("Clickers")

Personal Response Systems ("clickers") may be used in some classes. If clickers are to be used in a class, it is the responsibility of the student to ensure that the device is activated and functional. Students must see their instructor if they have any concerns about whether the clicker is malfunctioning. Students must use only their own clicker. If clicker records are used to compute a portion of the course grade:

- the use of somebody else's clicker in class constitutes a scholastic offence
- the possession of a clicker belonging to another student will be interpreted as an attempt to commit a scholastic offence.

Academic Consideration for Missed Work

All students pursuing academic consideration, regardless of type, must contact their instructors no less than 24 hours following the end of the period of absence to clarify how they will be expected to fulfill the academic responsibilities missed during their absence. Students are reminded that they should consider carefully the implications of postponing tests or midterm exams or delaying submission of work, and are encouraged to make appropriate decisions based on their specific circumstances.

Policy on Academic Consideration for a Medical/Non-Medical Absence

(a) Consideration on <u>Medical Grounds</u> for assignments worth *less than 10%* of final grade: Consult Instructor Directly and Contact Academic Advising

When seeking consideration on **medical grounds** for assignments worth *less than 10%* of the final course grade, the student should contact the instructor directly. The student need only share broad outlines of the medical situation. The instructor **may** require the student to submit documentation to the academic advisors, in which case she or he will advise the student and inform the academic advisors to expect documentation. If documentation is requested, the student will need to complete and submit the <u>Student Medical Certificate</u>. The instructor may <u>not</u> collect medical documentation. The advisors will contact the instructor when the medical documentation is received, and will outline the severity and duration of the medical challenge as expressed on the Student Medical Certificate and in any other supporting documentation. The student will be informed that the instructor has been notified of the presence of medical documentation, and will be instructed to work as quickly as possible with the instructor on an agreement for accommodation.

b) Medical Grounds for assignments worth 10% or more of final grade: Go Directly to Academic Advising

University Senate policy, which can be found at <u>Academic Calendar - Western University (uwo.ca)</u> requires that all student requests for accommodation on medical grounds for assignments worth 10% or more of the final grade be made directly to the academic advising office of the home faculty (for Huron students, the "home faculty" is Huron), with supporting documentation in the form (minimally) of the Senate-approved Student Medical Certificate found at:

The documentation is submitted in confidence and will not be shown to instructors. The advisors will contact the instructor when the medical documentation is received, and will outline the severity and duration of the medical challenge as expressed on the Student Medical Certificate and in any other supporting documentation. The student will be informed that the instructor has been notified of the presence of medical documentation, and will be instructed to work as quickly as possible with the instructor on an agreement for accommodation. The instructor will not normally deny accommodation where appropriate medical documentation is in place and where the duration it describes aligns with the due date(s) of assignment(s). Before denying a request for accommodation on medical grounds, the instructor will consult with the Dean. The instructor's decision is appealable to the Dean.

Students seeking academic consideration for a **non-medical** absence (e.g. varsity sports, religious, compassionate, or bereavement) will be required to provide appropriate documentation. All consideration requests must include a completed <u>Consideration Request Form</u>. Late penalties may apply at the discretion of the instructor.
