## **Course Description:**

A survey of the historical, artistic, philosophical, and religious factors that shape modern Japan. Taught in English.

Extra Information: 3 hours, 0.5 course.

# **Course Learning Objectives:**

- To acquire a basic knowledge of Japanese history, cultural heritage, and other "cultural" elements of the modern Japan.
- To develop a critical (and comparative) view toward a "foreign" culture.
- To exercise modern research methods
- To formulate questions and discover the answers

### **Class Methods:**

Introduction to Japanese civilization from historical, geo-political, and cultural perspectives. The course presupposes no knowledge of Japanese civilization. The course begins by listing the characteristics of modern Japanese culture. We will examine how these characteristics have evolved. The course will be conducted through lectures and classroom discussion based upon the reading materials, students' individual (mini) research, and/or video and other materials. Students are expected to prepare for each class by doing short (preliminary) research.

## **Required Course Texts:**

Varley, Paul. 1973/2000. *Japanese Culture Fourth Edition*. Honolulu: University of Hawai'i Press.

Other required reading materials will be posted in OWL.

Any supplementary reading on Japanese culture and history may be helpful.

#### **Methods of Evaluation/Assessment:**

- Four short (approx. 5-6 pages plus references) papers; they each constitute 20% of the final grade.

- The first short paper can be revised and resubmitted for re-evaluation.
- Participation will be 20% of the final grade.
- Due dates are absolute and late work will not be accepted without a prior approval.
- Plagiarism detection software may be used in this course. Assignments are electronically submitted.

## SPECIAL INSTRUCTIONS

As a default case, a student will receive an F automatically, if the student misses more than 1/3 of the total class hours (without proper excuses). For those who have technical issues with Zoom, discuss the situation with the instructor. Given the exceptional situation of the 2020–2021 academic year, students should consult the instructor if unexpected difficulties arise due to the online format. Any rules regarding the online-course format will be outlined at the first two class meeting.

## **Policy on attendance:**

Any student who, in the opinion of the instructor, is absent too frequently from class or laboratory periods in any course will be reported to the Dean (after due warning has been given). On the recommendation of the Department concerned, and with the permission of the Dean, the student will be debarred from taking the regular examination in the course.

## **Special examination:**

A special examination is any examination other than the regularly scheduled examination. Special exams will be allowed only on receipt of medical documentation verifying a serious illness that kept the student from writing the exam as originally scheduled. Such documentation is strictly confidential and kept in the student's file. In the case of missing a final exam for documented medical reasons, a special exam will be set within thirty days.

Special exams will not be granted for occasions such as employment interviews, weddings, bar mitzvahs, family reunions, vacations, misreading the exam timetable, or oversleeping. Neither will special exams be granted in order to facilitate transportation arrangements, such as booking flights for home for Christmas or summer vacations. It is the policy of Huron [University] College to discourage informal arrangements by faculty which circumvent this regulation"

## Prerequisite and Antirequisite Information

# **Statement on Use of Electronic Devices**

# Statement on Use of Personal Response Systems ("Clickers")

Personal Response Systems ("clickers") may be used in some classes. Students must see their instructor if they have any concerns about whether the clicker is malfunctioning. Students must use only their own clicker. If clicker records are used to compute a portion of the course grade:

- the use of somebody else's clicker in class constitutes a scholastic offence
- the possession of a clicker belonging to another student will be interpreted as an attempt to commit a scholastic offence.

## **Academic Consideration for Missed Work**

Students who are seeking academic consideration for missed work during the semester may submit a self-reported absence form online provided that the absence is **48 hours or less** and the other conditions specified in the Senate policy at

Students whose absences are expected to last **longer than 48 hours**, or where the other conditions detailed in the policy are not met (e.g., work is worth more than 30% of the final grade, the student has already used 2 self-reported absences, the absence is during the final exam period), may receive academic consideration by submitting a Student Medical Certificate (for illness) or other appropriate documentation (for compassionate grounds). All students pursuing academic consideration, regardless of type, must contact their instructors no less than 24 hours following the end of the period of absence to clarify how they will be expected to fulfill the

academic responsibilities missed during their absence. Students are reminded that they should consider carefully the implications of postponing tests or midterm exams or delaying submission of work, and are encouraged to make appropriate decisions based on their specific circumstances.

Students who have conditions for which academic accommodation is appropriate, such as disabilities or ongoing or chronic health conditions, should work with Accessible Education Services to determine appropriate forms of accommodation. ## Policy on Academic Consideration for a Medical/Non-Medical Absence

# (a) Consideration on <u>Medical Grounds</u> for assignments worth *less than 10%* of final grade: Consult Instructor Directly and Contact Academic Advising

When seeking consideration on **medical grounds** for assignments worth *less than 10%* of the final course grade, and if the student has exceeded the maximum number of permissible Self-Reported absences, the student should contact the instructor directly. The student need only share broad outlines of the medical situation. The instructor **may** require the student to submit documentation to the academic advisors, in which case she or he will advise the student and inform the academic advisors to expect documentation. If documentation is requested, the student will need to complete and submit the <u>Student Medical Certificate</u>. The instructor may <u>not</u> collect medical documentation. The advisors will contact the instructor when the medical documentation is received, and will outline the severity and duration of the medical challenge as expressed on the Student Medical Certificate and in any other supporting documentation. The student will be informed that the instructor has been notified of the presence of medical documentation, and will be instructed to work as quickly as possible with the instructor on an agreement for accommodation.

# (b) Consideration on Non-Medical Grounds: Consult Huron Support Services/Academic Advising, or email <a href="mailto:huronsss@uwo.ca">huronsss@uwo.ca</a>.

Students seeking academic consideration for a **non-medical** absence (e.g. varsity sports, religious, compassionate, or bereavement) will be required to provide appropriate documentation where the conditions for a Self-Reported Absence have not been met, including where the student has exceeded the maximum number of permissible Self-Reported. All consideration requests must include a completed <u>Consideration Request Form</u>. Late penalties may apply at the discretion of the instructor.
