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Description:

A course on earlier periods in the history of Jewish philosophy.

There is no presumption that students have studied philosophy before, or that they have any knowledge or experience of the Jewish religion.

One way of thinking about the philosophy associated with Judaism is to see it as involving an attempt to provide a reasoned defense for certain central religious practices and beliefs. In this course, the focus will be on historical defenses of some kinds of

- ritual observance
- ethical conduct
- beliefs concerning the nature of the universe
- beliefs concerning the nature of human beings
- beliefs concerning the nature and existence of an everlasting supreme being thought to be the creator and ruler of everything.

In 2021, the course will cover both less and more than its official title indicates. It will start not with the very beginnings in Jewish philosophy, but with early Jewish philosophical writing of the medieval period, which had a profound effect on the nature of a kind of Jewish religious thinking that remains influential today. Most of the course will be given over to the original presentation during the medieval periods of arguments offered on behalf of particular religious ideas. A wide range of views will be considered, but one philosopher more than any other will be focused upon – the great 12th century figure Maimonides (the Rambam – 1138 CE-1204 CE). The course will also extend beyond the Renaissance to include the early modern philosopher Baruch Spinoza (1632 CE-1677 CE) – certainly the greatest Jewish philosopher in the Western philosophical tradition.

Objectives:

The aim of the course will be to familiarize students with unfamiliar styles of philosophical argument, and to enable students to set these styles of argument in their differing historical contexts, so that they themselves can develop reasoned assessments of the strengths and weaknesses of competing philosophical views of a certain kind of religious life and thought.

Method of Instruction:

Lecture, with student/instructor question and answer.

Texts:

Medieval Jewish Philosophical Writings, edited by Charles Manekin (Cambridge: Cambridge University Press, 2007)

Benedict De Spinoza, *Theological-Political Treatise*, edited by Jonathan Israel, translated by Michael Silverthorne (Cambridge: Cambridge University Press, 2007)

These texts are available in both hardcopy and electronic versions from the University bookstore.

Assessment:

Students' grades will be determined on the basis of **two very short essays for which no outside research is required** – each 3-4 pages in length, and **each worth 33** % – for a total of **66** %.

There will also be a **final examination** worth **34** %.

1. The due dates for the essays are Friday October 1 and Friday November 5.

The essays **MUST** be submitted in hard copy at the Huron University College essay dropbox by noon on the relevant due dates. The essays **MUST** uploaded as a PDF file to **OWL** by noon on the relevant due dates. For each essay, the topic will appear on **OWL** at approximately 10 AM, 48 hours preceding the due date. **Note that you have** *48 hours* in which to complete each assignment. **Obviously, you need to arrange your work schedule appropriately.**

Under no circumstances will extensions be granted by me acting alone Students who fail to submit an essay on time must consult the Academic Counsellor. In such a case, if there is a recommendation from the Academic Counsellor, students who get such a recommendation from the academic Counsellor must submit their assignments within 48 hours of the Academic Counsellor's recommendation. Notwithstanding the above, students who FOR ANY REASON AT ALL fail to submit the two essays at the appropriate time will not be permitted to write the final exam.

 The final exam will be written during the final exam period at a date and time specified by the University.
 More information about the format will be provided on the last day of class Students who for any reason at all miss the scheduled final exam and are granted permission to write the special final on the date specified by the College must understand that both the content and the format of the special final may be different from the regularly scheduled final exam.

Prerequisite and Antirequisite Information

Students are responsible for ensuring that they have successfully completed all course prerequisites and that they have not completed any course antirequisites. Pandemic Contingency

In the event of a COVID-19 resurgence during the course that necessitates the course delivery moving away from face-to-face interaction, all remaining course content will be delivered entirely online, typically using a combination of synchronous instruction (i.e., at the times indicated in the timetable) and asynchronous material (e.g., posted on OWL for students to view at their convenience). Any remaining assessments will also be conducted online at the discretion of the course instructor. Statement on Use of Electronic Devices

It is not appropriate to use electronic devices (such as, but not limited to, laptops, cell phones) in the classroom for non-classroom activities. Such activity is disruptive and distracting to other students and to the instructor, and can inhibit learning. Students are expected to respect the classroom environment and to refrain from inappropriate use of technology and other electronic devices in class.

Statement on Use of Personal Response Systems ("Clickers")

Personal Response Systems ("clickers") may be used in some classes. If clickers are to be used in a class, it is the responsibility of the student to ensure that the device is activated and functional. Students must see their instructor if they have any concerns about whether the clicker is malfunctioning. Students must use only their own clicker. If clicker records are used to compute a portion of the course grade:

- the use of somebody else's clicker in class constitutes a scholastic offence
- the possession of a clicker belonging to another student will be interpreted as an attempt to commit a scholastic offence.

Academic Consideration for Missed Work

Students who are seeking academic consideration for missed work during the semester may submit a self-reported absence form online provided that the absence is **48 hours or less** and the other conditions specified in the Senate policy at

Students whose absences are expected to last **longer than 48 hours**, or where the other conditions detailed in the policy are not met (e.g., work is worth more than 30% of the final grade, the student has already used 2 self-reported absences, the absence is during the final exam period), may receive academic consideration by submitting a Student Medical Certificate (for illness) or other appropriate documentation (for compassionate grounds). All students pursuing academic consideration, regardless of type, must contact their instructors no less than 24 hours following the end of the period of absence to clarify how they will be expected

to fulfill the academic responsibilities missed during their absence. Students are reminded that they should consider carefully the implications of postponing tests or midterm exams or delaying submission of work, and are encouraged to make appropriate decisions based on their specific circumstances.

Students who have conditions for which academic accommodation is appropriate, such as disabilities or ongoing or chronic health conditions, should work with Accessible Education Services to determine appropriate forms of accommodation. Policy on Academic Consideration for a Medical/ Non-Medical Absence

(a) Consideration on <u>Medical Grounds</u> for assignments worth *less than 10%* of final grade: Consult Instructor Directly and Contact Academic Advising

When seeking consideration on **medical grounds** for assignments worth *less than 10%* of the final course grade, and if the student has exceeded the maximum number of permissible Self-Reported absences, the student should contact the instructor directly. The student need only share broad outlines of the medical situation. The instructor **may** require the student to submit documentation to the academic advisors, in which case she or he will advise the student and inform the academic advisors to expect documentation. If documentation is requested, the student will need to complete and submit the <u>Student Medical Certificate</u>. The instructor may <u>not</u> collect medical documentation. The advisors will contact the instructor when the medical documentation is received, and will outline the severity and duration of the medical challenge as expressed on the Student Medical Certificate and in any other supporting documentation. The student will be informed that the instructor has been notified of the presence of medical documentation, and will be instructed to work as quickly as possible with the instructor on an agreement for accommodation.

(b) Consideration on <u>Non-Medical</u> Grounds: Consult Huron Support Services/Academic Advising, or email <u>huronsss@uwo.ca</u>.

Students seeking academic consideration for a **non-medical** absence (e.g. varsity sports, religious, compassionate, or bereavement) will be required to provide appropriate documentation where the conditions for a Self-Reported Absence have not been met, including where the student has exceeded the maximum number of permissible Self-Reported. All consideration requests must include a completed <u>Consideration Request Form</u>. Late penalties may apply at the discretion of the instructor.
