Course Description:

This course dives into the complex dynamics of "development" broadly defined. It starts by visiting 4 key theoretical approaches to what development is and how it is applied. Is development about freedom and individual capabilities? Is it a state-led process of structural change and industrialization? Or is development irremediably linked to dispossession and deep-seated inequalities? After having discussed these questions through three different theoretical frameworks, we will explore key questions about the social, political, and economic processes associated with development. We will think through questions such as whether economic growth is associated to wellbeing? what political (and policy) approaches are effective at tackling poverty and to what extent do they reduce inequality? What does technology have to do with development? Is there room to imagine different futures in the midst of the already-existing complex and interconnected economic and socio-political realities? We embark in these discussions at a time when the world is confronting multidimensional crises such as global warming, the COVID19 pandemic and sharpening inequalities between the richest minority and the majority of the population in the world.
