Course Description:

Huron's CGS is partnering with London's Cross-Cultural Learning Centre to produce a set of tools to facilitate newcomer youth's access to university education and social life in Canada. In this course, students will produce a series of tools that would facilitate access to university in Canada (campus life, programs, funding), active community participation

(through leadership, civic actions, activism), and wellbeing. In order to produce these tools students will work in groups to produce workshops on these or other related topics, and produce a "tool" that can be an infographic, a comic, a brochure, etc., that can be made available to other young newcomers in the future.

Learning Outcomes:

- a. Students will practice working in partnership with a community organization, including establishing working relationships with partners, identifying areas of collaboration and cocreating with them.
- b. Students will have learned about challenges and obstacles found by young newcomers in accessing higher education and becoming active parts of social life in London, Ontario.
- c. Students will apply self-reflection as part of their partnership work.
