Course Description:

This course critically examines how practices of Global Development are typically reduced to problems of management. The course will provide students with a critical examination of how Global Development management paradigms are problematic and, at times, reduce the interconnected and complex issues causing global inequalities to simple, easily measurable solutions. The course blends a combination of theoretical critiques and practical exercises of development project management. Students will also explore alternative approaches to development management.

Learning Outcomes:

The learning objectives for the course are: • To increase knowledge of technical and practical skills required for project management • To examine methodologies used for the various phases of project planning and the project cycle • To analyze assumptions that inform project management in global development • To consider ethical and methodological issues that arise for project managers and researchers in the context of conducting international work • To understand the critiques leveled against global development project management
