Course Description:

This edition of GLOBAL RESISTANCE MOVEMENTS will focus on global health inequalities in its intersection of gender and race. It will also explore how women have organized locally, globally, and transnationally to address and fight such inequalities. Finally, this course is an examination of the political, social, and cultural foundations of resistance movements related to the gender gap in global health.

For each topic discussed—such as reproductive health, aging, mental health—we will study one or more women-led resistance movements that have historically or presently addressed these issues. A multidisciplinary and multimedia approach will be employed, allowing students to engage with foundational texts and various multimedia sources, including TV shows, podcasts, and documentaries.

Learning Outcomes:

- Understand the impact of gender on health experiences and outcomes.
- Analyze how race, gender, and socio-political contexts influence medical research and healthcare.
- Examine the role of media and information technology in shaping health narratives and access.
- Critically engage with contemporary debates on reproductive justice and mental health.
- Develop a nuanced perspective on global health issues through a gendered lens.
- Learn about and support resistance movements around the world that fight against gender inequality in global health.
