Course Description:

How sexual and gender differences are socially and culturally constructed has a significant impact in global inequalities. This impact is manifested in unequal access to material resources (e.g., land) and wealth (poverty). Global inequalities based on sexual difference persist in health outcomes, access to vital resources such as water, as well as in migration, conflict, social reproduction, and care labour.

This course explores the different ways in which gender and sexual differences affect those critical issues in development mentioned above, with a particular emphasis on collective responses to such challenges. The course provides an opportunity to study how such global inequalities and development issues manifest themselves in specific socioeconomic contexts around the world and how they are addressed in practice and in everyday life.

Learning Outcomes:

Identify and outline key concepts in recent scholarly and activist circles on global inequalities based on sexual difference

Demonstrate critical analytical skills and awareness on the ways in which global inequalities based on sexual difference shape development discourses and practices

Mobilize (i.e., apply) a critical and interdisciplinary approach to understand practices that aim at addressing global inequalities based on sexual difference
