Welcome to taking the next steps on your pathway through theological education at Huron University—a time of spiritual growth, intellectual challenge, and professional development. Whether you're returning to university in your career, continuing directly from previous studies, or entering the next (or final!) year of your program at Huron, selecting your courses is a critical step in shaping your academic experience and achieving your vocational goals.

This handbook is designed to help you make informed and strategic decisions about your course selection. Our Master of Theological Studies (MTS) and Master of Divinity (MDiv) programs offer lots of flexibility through both interfaith courses and specialized pathways. With that freedom comes the responsibility to ensure your choices align with your program requirements, research or professional interests, and long-term career aspirations.

If you're aiming to deepen your knowledge in a specific field, explore new disciplines, try something new, or position yourself for further academic study or career advancement, thoughtful course selection is essential. Use this handbook as a practical companion throughout your planning process. Remember, the best course choices are the ones that serve both your academic requirements and your personal interests.

New Students

Welcome!

Navigating your first year as an MTS or MDiv student can be quite exhilarating! There are many exciting courses to choose from which are taught by world-renowned scholars in the field of Theology—right at Huron.

Huron University's academic year is divided into three terms:

September to December (Fall term)

January to April (Winter term)

May to August (Summer term)

Students who are considering a **full-time course load** must take at least seven courses in an academic year (September to April), with ten courses as the normal full-time course load. Students who are considering a **part-time course load** take anywhere between one to six courses in an academic year (September to April). Our summer term falls outside of the traditional year. Taking courses in this term is optional and they are generally Elective courses that are offered in this term, depending on professor availability.

All Masters-level courses at Huron are noted by the 5000-level, while bachelor's level courses are in the 1000-4000 series. Here's some additional information:

- "A" courses are offered in the Fall term (September to December)
- "B" courses are offered in the Winter term (January to April).
- Courses without "A" or "B" are full-year courses (September to April, e.g., Religious Studies 2130).

Synchronous Classes

All classes in the Faculty of Theology at Huron University are offered in a hybrid in-person/online, synchronized format by tuning through Zoom at the scheduled time. Students living in the London area are expected to attend classes on campus, in-person, unless the course is offered online only. Note that classes are not recorded for later viewing.

Students living in London may petition to take courses online if absolutely necessary. Please request permission from the Dean of Theology to receive approval for online attendance by emailing us at theology@huron.uwo.ca. Regardless of location, students approved to take courses online must also notify the instructor.

Whether you are taking on a part-time or full-time course load, we have listed suggested courses to start your academic year **at the end of this Handbook, starting on page 12**. By taking these recommended first-year courses, you will then be able to take upper-year courses to allow you to complete your program in the suggested time. Please note that not every course listed in your degree map is offered, and some appear in alternating years. We recommend selecting as many mandatory courses as possible in your first year and leaving Elective courses for your final years.

Part of what makes our MTS and MDiv programs contextually relevant is our **Multireligious Engagement Requirement**. The Faculty of Theology is proud to offer courses in both Christian and Islamic Studies. All students are required to ensure that at least one course from any Area or General Elective must focus on a religious tradition other than their own.

In addition to our Multireligious Engagement Requirement, the Faculty of Theology

requires all MTS and MDiv students to attend on-campus Intensives. Offered twice each year, these Intensives are designed to gather together students, Faculty, and staff around a contemporary topic or issue in the field of Theology. Our Intensives are usually centered around a notable guest lecturer, such as our annual R.T. Orr Lecture in the Fall term, or more experiential such as travelling to The Mohawk Institute or local Mosques and community centres. Whereas MTS students are required to attend two over the course of their program, MDiv students are required to attend three. More information about our Intensives take shape in the term in which they are offered, either the Fall or Summer terms.

Multi Factor Authentication

Multi-Factor Authentication (MFA) is an authentication method in which a user is granted access only after successfully presenting two or more pieces of evidence to prove their identity. Duo Security is being used to secure MFA enabled services at Western University.

There are several ways to set up your MFA. Western Recommends using a

mobile device and the mobile app called “Duo”. This method is by far the easiest and most convenient option for most people (in fact, most end up using this method even after choosing a different one initially).

No mobile phone? You can also use a landline, tablet, or obtain a hardware token. Duo lets you link multiple devices to your account, so you can use your mobile phone and a landline, a landline and a hardware token, two different mobile devices, etc.. Course Registration

Registration Appointments

Every year, Western University sends out an email letting students know when to register for their courses within a particular timeline. This notification is mainly for bachelor’s students since MTS and MDiv students at Huron can begin registering for courses as soon as our timetable is ready.

Adding a Class

After consulting your degree map, you can start building your schedule by using Western University’s [Draft My Schedule](#) system (see page 11 for details). You are not required to finish your entire schedule in one sitting, but in order to officially register in your courses, you MUST log into your [Student Centre](#) to formally register in your classes. Choose “Academics”, “Course Registration”, and then select “Search and Add” to find your courses. Note that it is much easier to type in the course number for accuracy (e.g., for Biblical Studies 5110A, type “5110” in the search bar).

Remember, if you have permission to take all your courses online, email us your list of courses after registering.

1. Plan your schedule
 - a. Navigate to [Draft My Schedule](#)
 - b. Choose “Build a Draft” and begin selecting courses
2. Register for your courses
 - a. Log into [Student Centre](#)
 - b. Select “Academics”, “Course Registration”, “Search and Add”
 - c. Search for the course(s) by entering in the Course Number(s) (e.g., for Systematic Theology 5103A: Intro to Systematic Theology, type 5103)
 - d. Choose “Enroll” and then “Next”
 - e. Review your selections for any errors or warnings.
 - f. Choose “Submit”
3. View your Class Schedule
 - a. In your [Student Centre](#), select “Academics”, then “Course

- Registration”, then “Enrollment Summary”, then “Calendar View”
- b. If you see your courses on your calendar, you have successfully registered for them!

Dropping a Class

1. Under the “Academics” in your [Student Centre](#) select “Drop a Class”.
2. Select the class you wish to drop.
3. Click “Drop Selected Classes”.
4. Click “Finish Dropping”.

If there is an error:

1. Check that you have the prerequisite courses
2. Check for any antirequisite courses
3. Check for any timetable conflicts
4. If the class says “FULL” or you are still unable to register for your courses, please contact us immediately at theology@huron.uwo.ca

New & Returning Students

Bachelor's courses (1000-4000 series) and other 5000s

Permission must be granted by the Dean of Theology to take courses at the Bachelor's level at Huron University, Western University, King's University College, or St. Peter's Seminary. Should you find a course in Western's Timetable that would complement your degree program, please petition to take the course by writing to theology@huron.uwo.ca. Note that many of these courses are not offered online. Please contact the respective departments for course information.

Independent Studies

You may fill a General Elective space on your degree map by organizing an Independent Study course with a Faculty member if they are available. This is an opportunity to take a deeper dive into a topic not normally offered at Huron.

If you are interested in suggesting an Independent Study course, please consult the Faculty member at least one term in advance. Faculty members are limited in the number of Independent Study courses they offer.

Course Audits

Course auditing refers to attending classes without the obligation to complete

assignments or earn a grade. Those who are interested in auditing a course must seek permission from both the professor and the Dean of Theology before entering the class. Please note that not all courses allow auditing. By the deadline to add a course for the term, acquire faculty member's written permission and email us at theology@huron.uwo.ca for permission to register as an auditor.

Taking Courses Outside of Huron University

Interested in taking a course at a university outside Western University? Request permission from the Dean of Theology by sending us the respective course outline.

Incomplete Courses from Previous Years

If you still have an incomplete course on your record, and it is not completed by the beginning of the following term, Western can reduce the number of courses you may sign up for by the number of incompletes you are holding. Please contact us for more information.

Add/Drop Deadlines

You can change your courses by dropping and adding right up to the deadlines below:

September 17	Last day to add or drop a Fall term course. Courses dropped by this date will not appear on a transcript; no fee penalty. Courses dropped after this date will appear on a transcript with a grade of 'WDN' (withdrawn, without academic penalty).
November 30	Last day to drop a Fall-term course without academic penalty. Course withdrawals after this date will appear on a transcript with a grade of 'F.'
January 12	Last day to add or drop a Winter 12-week course. Courses dropped by this date will not appear on a transcript. Courses dropped after this date will appear on a transcript with a grade of 'WDN' (withdrawn, without academic penalty).
March 30	Last day to withdraw from a Winter 12-week course resulting in a grade of 'WDN' (withdrawn, without academic penalty). Course withdrawals after this date will appear on a transcript with a grade of 'F.'

Tuition, Fees, and Financial Aid

A full-time course load includes in your tuition a bus pass from the London Transit Commission (LTC) and all full-time students are automatically enrolled into Western's Health Care plan, [PurpleCare](#). Students may choose to opt-out of this plan with proof of alternate coverage no later than September 23, 2026.

Decisions about our **Faculty of Theology Financial Aid** will be communicated to full-time students by the end of July. Part-time students will receive notice of their financial aid in September as the value of the bursary depends on the number of courses selected. This amount will be posted on your [Statement of Account](#) in a timely manner.

If you are awarded a bursary from the Faculty of Theology and withdraw from your courses or program, the bursary must be returned to Huron.

Western ONECard

Your Western ONECard is more than just a Photo ID Card. It functions as an identification card for [exams](#) and your [bus pass](#); is your [library card](#); your [meal plan card](#); and can be used for door access and vending machine purchases. It is also required to access [Campus Recreation](#) and to pick up a [parking permit](#). You must be a current student to receive a Western ONECard. Cards are available in Student Central at the Info Desk in the Western Student Services building. Parking at Huron

Huron offers annual, term, and monthly permits for students to park in the gated lot on the south side of campus off Burnlea Walk. Requests for parking will be reviewed against Huron's enrolled student list from the Huron Registrar's Office.

Parking permits will be fully reserved only after application and payments are made. Vehicle license plate recognition will be used for validating permit holders in the lot. It is crucial that permit holders register their vehicles (max. 2) with Huron. Failure to register your vehicle license plates will result in tickets and fines.

Complimentary parking is offered on weekends beginning Friday at 7 p.m. and ending on Monday morning at 3 a.m.

Passes are on a first come, first served basis. Once passes have been sold out, a waitlist will become available.

Accessible Education

“Accessible Education provides supports and services to students with disabilities at Western, in all programs and faculties.”

Students who wish to request academic accommodations must do so as soon as possible after they have registered. Academic accommodation is not assumed by the University, as students’ needs vary. Accordingly, students must indicate all new courses for which accommodation will be required by formally requesting accommodation.

Requests should be made during July and August for the upcoming academic year and in April or May for the Summer term.

Later requests will be considered; however, accommodation may not be arranged in time for the first set of tests and examinations. Requests for academic accommodation are made through [Accessible Education](#) at Western.

Accommodations for Religious Holidays

When scheduling your courses unavoidably conflicts with religious holidays which either requires an absence from the University or prohibits or requires certain activities making it impossible for the student to satisfy the academic requirements scheduled on the day involved, no student will be penalized for absence because of religious reasons.

Alternative means will be sought for satisfying the academic requirements involved. If a suitable arrangement cannot be worked out between the student and instructor, students should consult the Dean of Theology. It is the responsibility of students to inform professors concerning the work done in classes from which they are absent and to take appropriate action according to deadlines as per Western’s policy on [Accommodation for Religious Holidays](#).

Briefly, this policy explains that the student should give notice to his or her

course instructor and Dean as early as possible, but not later than two weeks prior to the writing of the examination, or one week prior to writing a mid-term.

Gender-Based Sexual Violence Training

Part of upholding community safety standards at Huron University is mandatory participation in Huron's Gender-Based Sexual Violence Training modules. If you are a new student, you may have already received an email from the GBSV Training Team to register for one of their online seminars. Please note that these sessions are mandatory. If you do not complete this training, you could end up losing access to OWL Brightspace and your Student Account may be locked.
