

# Global Great Books 1002F: The Pursuit of Happiness Mondays & Wednesdays, 10:30-12:00 (via Zoom)

**Professor:** Dr. John P. Hope

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**Office Hours:** By appointment

**Prerequisites:** None

### **Course Description**

What is happiness? How do we define it? How can we attain it? Is happiness a reliable indicator of a life well lived, or is it a mirage drawing us away from a higher purpose? In this course we will trace the paths of heroes and sages, philosophers and mystics as they chase after happiness and strive to determine what constitutes a good life. From Odysseus's homecoming to Milarepa's home-leaving, from Aristotle' embrace of reason to Raskolnikov's flashes of inspiration, we will watch our guides wrestle with some of the most compelling questions of human existence, and we will make their pursuit our own.

#### **Learning Objectives**

This course aims to help students to:

- Explore ideas about the human condition and articulate their own
- Understand the historical and cultural contexts of ideas
- Analyze and articulate their own belief systems
- Improve their ability to understand and engage with philosophical arguments
- Increase their skills in literary analysis
- Gain familiarity with works from a variety of global traditions
- Hone their ability to write clearly and argue convincingly

#### **Course Method**

This course will involve both synchronous meetings (during which we gather at the same time on Zoom to discuss our readings) and asynchronous components (pre-recorded lectures and forum posts on OWL). See below for more information.









#### **Recorded Lectures**

In advance of each class meeting you will receive a recorded lecture on aspects of the day's material. The lecture will give background information, present certain aspects of the readings we'll be discussing, and raise questions for us to consider during our online meetings. You are expected to listen to the lectures before we meet online.

#### **OWL Forum Posts**

We will be having eleven class meetings during the course of the intersession. In advance of EIGHT of them (whichever eight you choose), I would like you to make a post on our discussion forum on OWL. I will start the thread with some information and questions, and I would like you to respond by sharing your thoughts, responding to me or to your classmates, or raising some questions of your own. You should aim to write at least a paragraph. I will use these posts to guide our Zoom discussions towards your interests, and to make sure everyone gets a chance to express themselves. Since our meetings will be scheduled for 10:30 a.m., I will ask you to make your posts by 9:30 a.m. for full credit. These posts will be factored into your participation grade.

#### **Synchronous Classes on Zoom**

Since this class is taught in an online format, we will keep our synchronous meetings to 90 minutes, with class starting at 10:30 and running until 12:00. Attendance is mandatory and will be a part of your participation grade.

#### **Required Resources**

PDF files of all of our readings will be accessible on the OWL resources page. However, for the longer works especially (Homer's Odyssey and Dostoevsky's *Crime and* Punishment), I recommend getting your hands on a hard copy – your reading will be much more pleasant, and it will be easier to find specific passages to support your writing. The book-length works we will be reading in this course are:

- Homer, The Odyssey (translated by Robert Fagles)<sup>1</sup>
- Lao Tzu, *The Tao Te Ching* (translated by Stephen Mitchell)
- Tsangnyön Heruka, *The Life of Milarepa* (translated by Andrew Quintman)
- Fyodor Dostoevsky, *Crime and Punishment* (translated by Constance Garnett)<sup>2</sup>

All of these books are available through Chapters and Amazon, should you choose to buy a hard copy. They can also be found in many libraries.

## **Writing Assignments**

Over the course of the term you will write three short papers (1500 words minimum) analyzing the works we will read and discuss. These papers will be graded on the coherence of your argument, your use of textual evidence to support your points, and your attention to language, style, and structure. Topics and further guidelines will be presented as the deadlines approach.

#### **Final Exam**

There will be a three-hour take-home final exam during finals period (June 27-28). More information will be given to you as we approach the end of the semester.

#### **Student Code of Conduct**

#### **Prerequisite and Antirequisite Information**

Students are responsible for ensuring that they have successfully completed all course prerequisites and that they have not completed any course antirequisites. ## **Statement on Use of Electronic Devices**

It is not appropriate to use electronic devices (such as, but not limited to, laptops, cell phones) in the classroom for non-classroom activities. Such activity is disruptive and distracting to other students and to the instructor, and can inhibit learning. Students are expected to respect the classroom environment and to refrain from inappropriate use of technology and other electronic devices in class.

#### Statement on Use of Personal Response Systems ("Clickers")

Personal Response Systems ("clickers") may be used in some classes. If clickers are to be used in a class, it is the responsibility of the student to ensure that the device is activated and functional. Students must see their instructor if they have any concerns about whether the clicker is malfunctioning. Students must use only their own clicker. If clicker records are used to compute a portion of the course grade:

- the use of somebody else's clicker in class constitutes a scholastic offence
- the possession of a clicker belonging to another student will be interpreted as an attempt to commit a scholastic offence.

#### **Academic Consideration for Missed Work**

Students who are seeking academic consideration for missed work during the semester may submit a self-reported absence form online provided that the absence is **48 hours or less** and the other conditions specified in the Senate policy at

https://www.uwo.ca/univsec/pdf/academic\_policies/appeals/accommodation\_illness.pdf are met.

Students whose absences are expected to last **longer than 48 hours**, or where the other conditions detailed in the policy are not met (e.g., work is worth more than 30% of the final grade, the student has already used 2 self-reported absences, the absence is during the final exam period), may receive academic consideration by submitting a Student Medical Certificate (for illness) or other appropriate documentation (for compassionate grounds). All students pursuing academic consideration, regardless of type, must contact their instructors no less than 24 hours following the end of the period of absence to clarify how they will be expected to fulfill the academic responsibilities missed during their absence. Students are reminded that they should consider carefully the implications of postponing tests or midterm exams or delaying submission of work, and are encouraged to make appropriate decisions based on their specific circumstances.

Students who have conditions for which academic accommodation is appropriate, such as disabilities or ongoing or chronic health conditions, should work with Accessible Education Services to determine appropriate forms of accommodation. #### Policy on Academic Consideration for a Medical/ Non-Medical Absence

# (a) Consideration on <u>Medical Grounds</u> for assignments worth *less than 10%* of final grade: Consult Instructor Directly and Contact Academic Advising

When seeking consideration on **medical grounds** for assignments worth *less than 10%* of the final course grade, and if the student has exceeded the maximum number of permissible Self-Reported absences, the student should contact the instructor directly. The student need only share broad outlines of the medical situation. The instructor **may** require the student to submit documentation to the academic advisors, in which case she or he will advise the student and inform the academic advisors to expect documentation. If documentation is requested, the student will need to complete and submit the <u>Student Medical Certificate</u>. The instructor may <u>not</u> collect medical documentation. The advisors will contact the instructor when the medical documentation is received, and will outline the severity and duration of the medical challenge as expressed on the Student Medical Certificate and in any other supporting documentation. The student will be informed that the instructor has been notified of the presence of medical documentation, and will be instructed to work as quickly as possible with the instructor on an agreement for accommodation.

# (b) Consideration on Non-Medical Grounds: Consult Huron Support Services/Academic Advising, or email <a href="mailto:huronsss@uwo.ca">huronsss@uwo.ca</a>.

Students seeking academic consideration for a **non-medical** absence (e.g. varsity sports, religious, compassionate, or bereavement) will be required to provide appropriate documentation where the conditions for a Self-Reported Absence have not been met, including where the student has exceeded the maximum number of permissible Self-Reported. All consideration requests must include a completed Consideration Request Form. Late penalties may apply at the discretion of the instructor.
