Course Description:

This course will introduce students to the literary and cultural currents of Archaic and Classical Greece through the analysis of notable texts, followed by exploration of important cultural sites in Greece. Particular attention will be paid to the works as performance, and they will be situated in their broader historical and social context. We will seek to understand both what these works meant in their time and place of origin and what they may mean to us today.

- Understand the political and cultural context of works of Archaic and Classical Greek literature
- Examine the relationship between text and performance
- Explore ideas about the human condition
- Analyze and articulate their own beliefs
- Increase their skills in literary analysis
