Course Description:

This course examines the short history of capitalist agriculture. Across the course you will learn how this form deploys labour, technology and resources from the vantage point of humans, namely workers, producers and consumers.

Learning Outcomes:

The goal of this course is to develop interdisciplinary skills that help us understand (as in 'gain critical distance from') the dizzying complexity of a planetary system of production, circulation and subsumption of human bodies. We could be talking about purses as easily as we're talking about apples, and so this course strengthens general skills. Essential to our course is developing comfort with making claims about such complex systems- 'its processes depend on X structures of power' or 'its outputs determine social structures', e.g.- in order to understand the limited potential and vulnerability of the processes, structures and ideological commitments that seemingly hold it together. This is a course that exercises close reading and critical analysis in the interest of learning how to think beyond the limits of received ideas and argument.
