People recall the real and supposed war crimes differently, attempts to interpret their moral significance often become contentious. Therefore, this course also presents the students with opportunity to study various interpretations and memories.

Identify the geo-political and socio-economic forces that affect how people remember and reconstruct them

Evaluate historiographical debates among historians across a range of topics on war and memory in East Asia

Hone their analytical skills by examining new evidence on facets of these wars

Articulate their critical views, both in class discussion and in written work

Demonstrate the value of historical inquiry
