

Giving Back in More Ways Than One

Andrew explains he wanted to give back to Huron in a way that he felt would help both now, and in the future. While already a member of the Board of Governors, Andrew established an unrestricted fund which could be directed towards Huron's highest priority needs. Thus, The Betsy and Andrew Aziz President's Discretionary Fund was born.

Unrestricted funds, explains Andrew, have a two-pronged success strategy. "Personally, I like that it's operational in nature and that it also provides long-term financial stability for the institution. Ensuring Huron has a large endowment is a game-changer for eliminating worry for covering operating costs."

Andrew says giving back is different for everyone, but he has found what works for him. "Volunteering is figuring out where you can make a meaningful contribution. I like to give of my time and also financially; while I know my financial contribution isn't huge, it is meaningful."

Education is Life Changing for Those Who Can Access It

That's the belief of Moira Burke '80 and her husband, Larry Brennan. Each received financial support in the form of grants and loans when attending university which made all the difference. "I wouldn't have been able to attend otherwise," Moira shares bluntly.

The philanthropic couple say they have been very fortunate in their lives, and they wished to pay it forward. "It's our turn now," says Larry. "What goes around comes around." To that end, the couple established the Moira Burke & Larry Brennan Internship Fund for Governance, Leadership & Ethics (GLE) Students and The Moira Burke and Larry Brennan Bursary.

Why these two particular funds? "Back in the day it was fairly easy to get entry-level jobs and be able to train on the job but that's now changed. The GLE fund will offer students the opportunity to get their foot-in-the door," says Larry.

As for establishing a bursary, "it's about affording opportunities for those who may not otherwise get in," says Moira. "The bursary is an extension of our commitment to education," adds Larry.

"We asked ourselves how can we be effective," says Moira. "We don't have millions of dollars but what attracted us was that we know there are individual students at the end of the gift."

A Legacy of Gratitude and Giving

Dr. Don Melady '81 made his first donation exactly ten years post-graduation and hasn't stopped giving since.

"As soon as I got a full-time job, I felt it was important I started contributing," he says. Don, an emergency physician at Mount Sinai Hospital in Toronto, says that he firmly believes generosity changes lives.

"I received the Colonel Ibbotson Leonard Scholarship which paid for all of my tuition and three-quarters of my residence fees. I was a farm kid, the last of 8 kids to leave high school, and there certainly wasn't much money around," remembers Don.

Receiving that scholarship and graduating without debt enabled him to teach abroad, attend medical school, and then proceed with a specialization, he says. It's also what made him determined to pay it forward.

"Financial support allows students to make smart, informed decisions. Not only does this benefit the students themselves, but ultimately, benefits society as well."

Don's story is a powerful reminder that annual giving adds up to something extraordinary. It sustains scholarships, supports innovation, and ensures that future generations of students can access the same life-changing opportunities he did.

The Impact of a \$10 Million Investment

In February 2025, Fairfax Financial Holdings Limited committed \$10 million dollars to establish The Fairfax Centre for Free Enterprise. As Huron President, Dr. Barry Craig, says, "We believe (our students) can both be successful in their chosen careers and contribute to the creation of a better world for others. This new Centre will help inspire our students and promote the value of entrepreneurship for all of Canada."

For Prem Watsa, Chairman and CEO of Fairfax, helping students succeed is close to his heart, as he arrived in Canada from India over five decades ago as a student with only \$8 dollars to his name. Helping students prosper and giving them the tools they need is part of the Fairfax mission to give back to Canada.

"We believe that Huron University can help lead a revival of the entrepreneurial spirit that is key to our shared future," says Mr. Watsa. "With the creation of the Fairfax Centre for Free Enterprise at Huron University, we are making a statement: that we believe in Canada, and that it can be the land of opportunity for everyone, and that the free enterprise system

that has helped to make the country what it is today should be recognized, maintained and cultivated for the benefit of all Canadians."

Staying true to Huron's Leaders with Heart mission, the Centre will foster a community that is aware of the connection between economic growth and social progress and the vision, philosophies and values essential to the success of private enterprises in Canada and the free market system. The centre will:

- Drive student-focused programming with an outward facing view to foster communication and collaboration between business, academia, and government
- Offer new funding for related scholarly activity
- Support scholarships for students pursuing a related area of study
- Host think tanks, summits, and other events
- Provide mentorship and incubator / accelerator support for students' entrepreneurial concepts
- Foster discussion and the sharing of free enterprise perspectives

A \$5 Million Academic Enrichment Initiative

Shortly after the transformative gift from Fairfax Financial Holdings, The Schulich Foundation, one of Canada's largest foundations focused on higher-ed philanthropy, graciously committed a \$5 million donation to create the *Nation Builder Program*, an academic enrichment initiative to help Huron students understand how Canada really works through access to experts and prestigious internship opportunities, new courses, and co-curricular workshops and activities.

"This generous gift from the Schulich Foundation endorses our mission to educate pragmatic, thoughtful future leaders, and, in doing so, aligns with our vision to help build a stronger country," says Dr. Craig. "This program is going to broaden views and open doors by offering exceptional learning and networking opportunities, thereby enriching students' understanding of economic, political and civic life."

Helping students succeed while also ensuring the nation's – and the world's – future leaders are ones with business acumen and heart, was what inspired The Schulich Foundation's gift.

"We are proud to partner with Huron University, a leading liberal arts institution," said Judy Schulich, President of The Schulich Foundation. "We see a tremendous opportunity with the Nation Builder Program to help develop analytical, pragmatic and driven leaders who will make great contributions to improve our national productivity and prosperity."

The prestigious Nation Builder Program and elements of the exciting new Fairfax Centre for Free Enterprise will launch in September 2025.



When so much of our time is spent online, welcoming and inspiring spaces matter more than ever. In January 2025, Huron's new dining hall, located in the recently unveiled Burnlea Residence, officially opened its doors to hungry students, staff, and faculty.

The space is designed to welcome 350 people at a time and boasts expanded dining options, including double the serving stations, a larger salad bar, along with a state-of-the-art kitchen. A range of dietary requirements can be accommodated, and sustainability is at the forefront with enhancements such as a composting station off the main dining room.

The dining hall was designed not just with nourishment in mind, but also with the intention of fostering community and friendship.

"Building relationships and community has always been central to the Huron experience," says Steve Prisco '95, President & CEO of Aramark Canada, which owns Brown's Fine Food Services, Huron's food service provider. "From the old Refectory to the new Dining Hall, that tradition continues. Today, Leaders with Heart gather in a vibrant space to build meaningful relationships that last a lifetime."

PHILANTHROPY: SUSTAINING OUR MISSION TOGETHER

Philanthropy plays an important role in Huron's mission to develop Leaders with Heart. This includes endowed gifts, which are strategically invested in a professionally managed, diversified portfolio to provide long-term, sustainable support for Huron and our students.

Huron is fortunate to steward over 261 endowed funds in support of student scholarships, awards and bursaries, and other initiatives across diverse areas of the University. Distributions from endowed funds are reviewed annually and are currently calculated using a 4% payout (plus fees) based on a five-year rolling average of the endowment capital balance. We are grateful to those donors and community members who continue to invest in our students —and the University's future — through endowed gifts.




Actual dollars in, actual impact out here's how \$5,175,819 in cash received this year breaks down:
