

Brief Course Outline

Course Title: International Relations

Course Description:

What is "International Relations" (IR) and what sorts of questions do IR scholars ask? What concepts, assumptions and tools do IR scholars use to explain and understand the world? How does IR scholarship influence global affairs and vice versa? What key moments and contemporary issues animate the study of IR? This course explores these questions by surveying contemporary world politics and the various approaches used by scholars and policymakers to make sense of global affairs. Parts 1 and 2 of the course introduce the "sub-discipline" of IR, outlining the various stories that IR scholars- both conventional and critical- tell about the world. Part 3 explores specific issues in IR relating to international organizations and governance systems; norms, principles and legal regimes; global trade and development; environmental governance; transnational actors; borders and migration; and ongoing global conflict. In Part 4 we experientially apply our knowledge and draw on the approaches and tools discussed during the first term to critically evaluate their role and relevance for a comprehensive understanding of contemporary international relations and politics. Ultimately, this course will equip students with the conceptual toolbox required to approach the world within the context of IR scholarship. It provides a strong foundation from which students can go on to explore the always shifting rich terrain of current affairs, international politics, and global governance.
