Course Title: Introduction to Politics

Course Number and Section: POLISCI 1020E 556

Course Description:

POL1020 introduces students to the study of politics. The course focuses on ideas (e.g. politics, power, democracy, justice, freedom), ideologies (e.g. liberalism, conservatism, socialism, feminism), institutions (e.g. the nation state, constitutions, legislatures, executives, the judiciary), political mobilization (e.g. participation, elections, parties, interest groups), and research skills, emphasizing Canadian, comparative, and international examples.

In the current age of 'fake news', disinformation, and misinformation, there will be a strong emphasis throughout the course on students acquiring information literacy skills, and particularly the ability to discern reputable news sources. There will be an equally strong emphasis on students consulting such reputable news sources on a daily basis (moving away from acquiring news through 'soundbites' via social media platforms) and understanding current developments around the world through political science frameworks.

Learning Outcomes:

Students will have definitional knowledge and understanding of political science, a rudimentary knowledge and understanding of the principal theories of political analysis, a preliminary knowledge and appreciation of political science in the context of other disciplines, and an ability to search for, gather, review, and evaluate materials relevant to the core substantive learning objectives of POL1020

Students will have further developed time management / organization skills via meeting assignment deadlines, as well as public speaking skills through contributing consistently to class and group discussions
