Course Description:

What makes murder a crime? This course explores the historical and legal evolution of murder and of the adversarial murder trial in England. Each week students will examine a different type of murder - infanticide, domestic murder, serial killings- using coroners' records, trial transcripts, police files, popular broadsides, newspaper reports, and other relevant primary sources. Our case studies focus on historical English trials with some Canadian and American examples.

Learning Outcomes:

Understand the historical evolution of legal definitions of murder in the common-law system and their application in British and Canadian courts;

Critically analyze individual case studies in their contemporary legal, social, scientific, and cultural context;

Display close reading and writing skills that will equip you for advanced study; effectively organize your time and meet course deadlines;

Conduct original research using primary and secondary materials, and confidently present your research findings orally and in writing;
