This course is an introduction to the major ideas, issues, and figures in the history of political philosophy in the Western tradition, from classical Greece until the end of the 19th century. We will examine classical themes concerning the nature of justice, democracy, power, and the ideal ruler. We will also cover influential topics in the social contract tradition, such as the legitimate grounds for political authority and property. Along the way, we will encounter thinkers who explore themes of domination and oppression, especially as it relates to gender, colonialism, and class.
