## **Course Description:**

In the first part of the course, students will examine two theories about the conditions under which nations and nationalism can be said to exist. In the second part of the course, students will read an influential statement of a set of ideas according to which we cannot and should not think that our moral obligations must be cosmopolitan, but instead we must recognize that the people of a nation have special obligations to their fellow citizens.

### Learning Outcomes:

Students will learn to assess the comparative merits of competing explanatory theories in history and political science.

Students will confront the difficulties in determining the conditions of application for fairly abstract general theoretical terms such as 'people' (as in 'a people'),, 'nation', 'state', and 'nation-state'.
