

POLITICAL SCIENCE 2295F	Dr. Zheger Hassan	American Government and Politics	This course introduces students to the workings of the American political system and government. The course will highlight the ways that political polarisation contributes to the dysfunction we are observing in America.
POLITICAL SCIENCE 2298F	Dr. Laszlo Sarkany	Canadian Foreign Policy	The aim of this course is to introduce students to the history, the processes, the ideational foundations and the current debates in Canadian foreign policy. Particular attention will be paid to the role of international, domestic, and ideational sources of Canadian foreign policy-making.
POLITICAL SCIENCE 3343G	Dr. Laszlo Sarkany	European Union: The Politics of Integration	In this course students will be introduced to, and compelled to critically think about, the 'European integration project'. Particular attention will be paid to the processes, institutions and outcomes of ongoing integration.
POLITICAL SCIENCE 3394F	Dr. William Kujala	Political Theory of Policing	This course examines central concepts and questions of political philosophy concerning rights, authority, rule of law, justice, and democracy through an examination of police power in North America. The course examines foundational justifications (and criticisms) of police power and proceeds through an examination of specific issues in the politics of policing of importance today.
POLITICAL SCIENCE 3395G	Dr. Laszlo Sarkany	Human Rights, Artificial Intelligence and Cybersecurity	The aim of this course is to compel students to think critically about how artificial intelligent (AI) systems impact notions of privacy, discrimination, inclusion, transparency and accountability, and others. Further attention will be paid to the dynamics, and the attempts at regulating cyberspace and cyberwar.
POLITICAL SCIENCE 3397F	Dr. Zheger Hassan	Contemporary Challenges to Democracy	The goal of the course is to help students understand how and to what extent modern democracies are under threat. It will do so by furnishing students with the tools for examining and evaluating the contemporary assault on democracies.
POLITICAL SCIENCE 3397G	Dr. Zheger Hassan	State and Society in the Middle East-	This course will introduce students to the political, social, and economic institutions of the modern Middle East. We will examine key themes such as political systems (i.e., regime-types), social and political culture, economic structures and outcomes, and state-society relations.
