Course Description:

This course offers a foundational introduction to qualitative research in psychology. Students will learn how qualitative researchers design studies, collect and analyze data, establish trustworthiness, and ethically engage participants. Through readings, workshops, and iterative assignments, students will learn how qualitative methods complement quantitative approaches and generate rich, contextualized understandings of psychological phenomena. Emphasis will be placed on hands-on experience with qualitative data collection techniques such as interviewing and field observation, data analysis approaches, and knowledge mobilization in both traditional and non-traditional formats.

Prerequisites(s): Registration in third or fourth year Honours Specialization in Psychology or permission of the department.

Learning Outcomes: one outcome per entry

Understand and describe different qualitative approaches used in psychology to study people's experiences, meanings, and social contexts.

Develop appropriate qualitative research questions and choose methods that fit the type of questions they want to ask.

Collect qualitative data ethically and thoughtfully, using interviews, observations, or existing texts.

Analyze qualitative data to identify patterns and themes and use evidence from the data to support interpretations.

Communicate and reflect on qualitative research, including evaluating its quality, explaining methodological choices, and considering the researcher's role in the process.
